#### A message from our Executive Director

"I am proud that we have been able to exceed our vision six years early by improving the lives of 22.8 million people."

Croda Foundation was born to make a difference in a world where people still go hungry, basic healthcare needs are not met, and vital ecosystems remain under threat. We knew we could make a positive impact, but what we, and our project partners have achieved in three years has exceeded all expectations.

We started with a vision; to sustainably improve at least one million lives by 2030 through projects that are adaptable, scalable and sustainable. I'm therefore extremely proud that we have been able to exceed this vision six years early by improving the lives of 22.8 million people.

All of this, of course, would not have been possible without our funding organisation, the FTSE 100 speciality chemicals company Croda International Plc. Starting our philanthropic endeavours in the depths of the COVID-19 pandemic brought challenges, but it also supercharged our impact. Following Croda's commercial success in producing lipid-based delivery systems for the first COVID-19 vaccines, we were generously gifted an additional £2 million to boost access to healthcare in our target communities (read more on page 14).

However, this partnership goes far beyond finances – the Foundation is embedded in Croda's culture. Employees are not only responsible for nominating projects, but they voluntarily add value to our partners on a case-by-case basis by providing their expertise and know-how, which has maximised our impact to date.

It has been a privilege to start and lead the Foundation over the last three years and I want to thank the teams at Croda for their support, my team for their first-class delivery and all our grant partners for delivering this impact. To say we now have a project portfolio of 38 projects in 22 countries, totalling £4.4m, is a tremendous feat for everyone involved. I look forward to working with our partners and Croda colleagues to sustainably improve even more lives in the coming years.

#### **About Croda Foundation**



Croda Foundation, which was established in 2020, is an independent charitable company founded, and solely funded by FTSE 100 specialty chemicals company Croda International Plc.

We are independently governed by a Board of Trustees and our direct funding by Croda is separate, and in addition to, Croda's own philanthropic and STEM efforts. The Foundation obtained charitable status from the Charity Commission for England and Wales in November 2021.

#### **Our Approach**

Croda Foundation's philanthropic approach to being People Positive requires our 'Three Ps':

PEOPLE

Croda Foundation is committed to utilising the skills, time and expertise of Croda people through the Foundation Changemaker programme.

PRODUCT

Croda's products, technologies and ingredients have the potential to make the biggest impact to sustainably improving lives in certain cases.

POUNDS

The Foundation provides grants to those organisations meeting our Funding Criteria.

We seek careful deployment of our funding resources to projects that deliver ongoing impact beyond the period of funding and we do this via our three **Focus Areas**:



Reducing hunger and poverty, and improving livelihoods by building resilience in communities



Improving access to healthcare and health provision by strengthening infrastructure in communities



Protecting and restoring ecosystems by improving biodiversity

Croda Foundation strives to sustainably improve lives. But what does that mean?

In line with our mission and three focus areas, we define impact as measurable and scalable improvement in the quality of life, socio-economic outcomes and access to healthcare of under-served communities in our targeted regions.

Creating long-term resilient communities involves implementing a combination of short-term interventions to address immediate needs and long-term initiatives to address root causes, building sustainable and adaptable foundations for the future.

#### **Impact Measurement**

Croda Foundation is guided by the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and is committed to having impact related to this global framework in our priority countries.

We believe that utilising our 'Three Ps' can have the greatest impact on our identified SDGs, which we have separated into Priority SDGs and Enabling SDGs.




#### Our impact to date

We set out to sustainably improve **one million lives by 2030**. To achieve this goal, we created three strategic milestones, so that by 2030:

- 450,000 people would have increased income and skills to better support their livelihoods
- 600,000 people would have access to healthcare and/or clean drinking water provision that they didn't previously have
- 30,000 trees would be planted through agroforestry projects


#### **Employee engagement**

#### **Nominators**

Our nomination model relies on Croda employees to put forward potential project partners for funding. Nominations are open all year round and are considered by Croda Foundation's trustee investment committee three times a year.

"In Africa, there is a saying: 'To empower a woman or girl will empower the whole society'. The Association of Women in Agriculture Kenya (AWAK) has tapped into the essence of those words by connecting with vulnerable women and supporting them to be self-sufficient.

#### Changemakers

As well as nominating, Croda employees also volunteer their time, skills and expertise through our Changemaker Programme. Changemakers are Croda employees who are seconded to certain roles within the Foundation or are people who volunteer their time and know-how to support our funded projects on the ground.





"I'd never worked in the charity sector before, so the opportunity was exciting for me and seeing what Croda wanted to achieve with the Foundation was something I really wanted to be part of," Jenny said. "I think the best thing about the Foundation is the team of people I get to work with, and getting to see the work our charity partners are doing and how much impact they are making. Seeing what they've achieved in such a short time and the impact this has had on so many people's lives is amazing!"



In 2023, Debora and Jonas, employees from Croda's seed enhancement specialist, Incotec, visited four tribes as part of our agroforestry project with **Instituto Amazonas**.

They provided technical support to the tribes on the growing and storage of traditional corn seeds and worked with the tribes and implementing partner on ideas that can enhance sustainability, such as finding a sample of traditional maize, which can be multiplied and distributed to other tribes.

Debora and Jonas said: "We found it insightful to learn about indigenous farming methods and how our expertise and knowledge in crop complimented existing practices to improve yield and better land management. We were able to provide seeds, and also share learnings on best storage practices and how to renew their seed bank."

Association of Women in Agriculture Kenya (AWAK) was awarded an initial grant of £30,000 to train and improve the livelihoods of women living in slums in Kenya, teaching them urban farming, baking, briquette making and business development skills. Based on the success of this inaugural project, Croda Foundation awarded AWAK two additional grants totalling £108,990 to continue their work.



# Accelerating and strengthening vaccination delivery in underserved communities in India

**British Asian Trust** was awarded a grant of £500,000 for accelerating and strengthening vaccination delivery in underserved communities across five states in India with a high incidence of COVID-19 and low vaccination rates. In May 2021, India was at the epicentre of the COVID-19 pandemic, accounting for 46% of the world's cases. The country's under-resourced health services were quickly overwhelmed, leading to India becoming one of only three countries to have recorded more than 400,000 deaths due to the disease.



# Using agroforestry to revive traditional practices among indigenous groups in Brazil

**Instituto Amazonas** was awarded a grant of £92,000 to revive traditional practices among indigenous groups in order to protect the cultural heritage, environment, health and well-being of indigenous populations in the Amazon. The organisation's mission is to develop training, income generation, food security, and digital education projects, aiming to create a sustainable and inclusive future for all communities in the region.
